

Education Impacts

- * Teachers work in isolation from one another
- * Limited access to the ideas, strategies, & planning with colleagues
- * Combination classroom creates additional constraints
 - * Two grade level academic standards to cover
 - * Same amount of time within the day given to single grade level classes


What will we do if didn't learn it?

- Limited ability to discuss and share student concerns and solutions daily with colleagues











Education Impacts

- Develop shared approaches to address student intervention and extension activities






Education Impacts - Intervention/Extension

WHAT - Professional Learning Communities-Processes

WHO - Students and Staff

HOW -

- * Teacher teams of three at each grade level.
 - * Greatly reduces need for combination classrooms
 - * More teachers at each grade level allow greater flexibility/creativity with targeted intervention
 - * Teaching staff can focus on grade level standards and expectations
 - * Consistency with class sizes
- * Enhanced PLC Collaboration at grade level
 - * Supports PLC process
 - * Eliminates single grade teachers ("singletons")
 - * Student benefit with educational intervention increases options

Social Emotional Impacts

WHO - Students

HOW -

- * Allows students to a experience a more diverse population
- * Increases opportunities to create and cultivate new friendships
- * Creates opportunity for 'teachable' moments for students with awareness of culture uniqueness in our community and society
- * Staff work within grade level teams to establish opportunities for students to build confidence, competence and problem solving
- Reduces/Eliminates the need for new enrollees to transfer to a different school based upon enrollment impaction (i.e., home school)

School Program Impacts

WHO - Students and Staff

HOW -

- * Allows for concentrated approach to school-wide programming
- * Allows a school master schedule more conducive to the grade spans at the site
 - ◆ (Example, 6th 8th grade has the ability to create and provide elective options for students within master schedule)
- Provides for targeting of staff development on site as a result of concentrated grade levels







Changes

- * Campus configuration
 - * K-4 and 5-8 realignment
- * Transportation
 - * Increase of bussing between schools obtaining fiscal implications
- * Facilities
 - * At startup ... movement between sites for adequate provision of furniture
- * School Activities
 - * Winter and Spring Programs at school sites will look/feel different
 - * Graduation
- * Sports Programs
 - * School would still field two teams per sport/season
